Learning Your Roots

Learning about your family roots is important, and the good news is that these days it is easier to do than ever before. New technology tools, including the likes of social media, mobile apps, and even the likes of Ancestral DNA tests, are not out of the reach of the budget of the average family.



One good tip is to start your quest with the information you already possess. Use the Ancestry.com website (or app) and fill in the data you know in regards to your family history. Another good tip is to take a DNA test and have your ethnicity broken down by percentage. You can then use AncestryDNA to look for those who may be a match for you.
